Sanctuary Congregation resolution passes

At the annual meeting Albany UU membership approved a Resolution to Become a Sanctuary Congregation. There was some discussion at the meeting about the feasibility of physical sanctuary in the building at 405 Washington Avenue, and about accountability mechanisms including the Social Responsibilities Council, the minister, and the Board of Trustees.

One amendment regarding implementation of the Resolution was proposed from the floor and approved (specifically, that the SRC would report its

Sanctuary activities on a regular basis not only to the Board, but to the congregation at large as well). A second amendment that would have required a congregational vote verifying a working definition of "extreme need" (the phrase used as a criterion of extending physical sanctuary) was voted down.

The Resolution to Become a Sanctuary Congregation, as amended, was passed with no dissenting votes and with three abstentions.

Staff changes at Albany UU

There are several changes coming up in the Religious Education program. Leah Purcell's **Director of Religious Education** position has a new look. She'll continue to run our Sunday school program and also focus more on an aspect that has been in her job description for several years—supporting parents and caretakers in their role as their children's primary religious educators. Leah will enhance the work she does now to curate and promote resources for parents and caretakers to use at home following up on the Sunday school sessions and parent support group meetings, family spiritual practices, and reading lists. At Leah's request, her position will become 3/4 time instead of full time.

We are hiring an **RE Assistant**, who will be supervised by Leah, to take over routine administrative and clerical tasks of the RE program and provide support for the DRE, teachers and other volunteers of the RE program. This is a 10-month position (August – May) 10-15 hours per week including one Sunday morning a month; flexible hours negotiated with the DRE; \$15/hr; to be posted the last week of May.

The approved 2018-19 budget includes a Lead

Youth Advisor position. The Youth Advisor will work with Leah and senior youth to continue to develop the senior youth program according to the UUA's guidelines "Six Pillars of Balanced Youth Ministry." The position is 10 hours a week and the pay is \$15/hr. Leah is forming a hiring committee for this position which will include several stakeholders including youth, parents/caretakers of youth, current youth advisors, and the RE Council. We anticipate posting this position in the last week of May, with a possible start date of Sept. 4.


We started advertising this week for a new Administrative Assistant, to replace Tammy Hathaway who is moving up to **Church Administrator** on July 1. The **Administrative Assistant** positon is 20 hours per week, and the pay is \$15-\$16 per hour. The Administrative Assistant has responsibility in the areas of building use and rentals, communications and general clerical support. S/he is the face of Albany UU for callers and visitors.

Board Notes

Latest update from the Governance Working Group (GWG)

Molly Daniels, Trustee

Currently, the members of GWG are Sam Trumbore, Peggy Sherman, and Molly Daniels, and we are in the process of adding an additional member.)

As we come to the close of the church year, the GWG continues to work on its newest charge from the Board of Trustees to develop a plan for implementation of the governance vision. The report found in the 2017-2018 Annual Report is a great source for more background on our activities starting last fall when the GWG received its initial charge to consider what changes might be made to Albany UU's governance structure through the April Board of Trustees meeting, where the vision and proposal was affirmed and GWG was charged with developing a plan for implementation. (Read the plan in the 2017-18 Annual Report, at members.albanyuu.org, in Office, File Cabinet.)

The GWG plans to continue to meet with committees to seek feedback and to hold congregational conversations to share the vision and seek feedback. In the meantime, GWG has discussed with Dick Dana, President; Patti Jo Newell, Vice President and Chair of the Program Coordinating Council (PCC); the Chair of REC, Jim Hutchins; the Chair of SRC, Matt Lesniak; and Barb Manning a proposal to pilot the Program Team model (the Operational/Ministry side of the proposal) starting this next church year. By piloting this, it would allow us to work through how this structure might work, seeking input from elected leaders and from other important leaders within the congregation. This piloting does not require any bylaw changes as we would be using an existing structure. We are looking forward to this piloting opportunity!

Once GWG has collected feedback from the above sources, an implementation plan will be presented to the Board of Trustees. Once this plan is approved, the Board of Trustees may charge GWG to begin drafting new policies and bylaws changes that will ultimately be considered at a congregational meeting.

Governance Vision Statement affirmed 4/19/18 by the Board

Through democratic process, the congregation of the First Unitarian Universalist Society of Albany chooses a Board of Trustees as its governing body and a minister as its



spiritual, programmatic and administrative leader.

Through its long-term planning and fiduciary responsibility, the Board ensures that the congregation will fulfill its mission far into the future.

Through its policy-making, the Board establishes a clear governance structure so that Board members, minister, staff and volunteer leaders understand where decisions are made and where accountability rests.

The Board communicates frequently with the congregation, encouraging broad input and diverse voices on issues, explaining how its decisions and directions support the mission of the church, and bringing major decisions to congregational vote.

The minister serves as Chief of Staff and on the Program Team, which also includes appointed lay leaders. The Program Team leads staff and volunteers in setting annual goals, planning programs and carrying out the work of the congregation to achieve its mission. Staff and volunteer leaders understand their roles and responsibilities. With guidance, they are empowered to carry out their responsibilities in creative ways and respond quickly to opportunities and choices. At the same time, each volunteer or staff leader works in collaboration with others to align his or her programs with others in a coherent congregational program.

There is a strong sense of partnership and shared mission and vision among the Board, minister, Program Team, and staff and volunteer leaders. Volunteers and staff take pride in and enjoy their work.

What does it mean to be a people of blessing?

It's often assumed that blessings come directly from God or through a priest, minister or rabbi from God. But our Soul Matters theme challenges us to think of blessing in other ways.

From my colleague, Katie Covey:

We UU's are a people of blessing because of our belief that each of us is able to bless and each of us is worthy to receive blessings.

This lens brought the whole month into focus.

Viewed through the lens of blessing, the Flower Communion becomes a UU Service of Blessing. We bless the flowers with our awareness. We bless each other with our simple message of diversity. We bless and heal each other and the world. This is the beauty of thematic ministry, the new angles which give our rituals life. There are several elements for the Flower Communion which I had never heard of. I hope some of the elements are new to you, too, as we steep ourselves in this uniquely UU ritual of blessing.

The lens of "Blessing" gave me a way to cover the celebration of Ramadan. The Muslims call the imperative to fast, a "blessing," and give thanks for the extra time to concentrate on helping the needy and studying the Quran. They understand that hardship can liberate us into blessing.

The lens of "Blessing" gave me a way of recognizing the fight for racial justice and covering Juneteenth. It


