General Assembly Plenary

Highlights of actions taken by Justice GA in Phoenix. (as reviewed by FUUSA Denominational Affairs Liaison Don Odell, xx, xx)

It is important to note that General Assembly (GA) 2012 was a gathering with multiple ways of engaging in justice work for people of all ages. Joining with the people of Arizona, delegates and attendees worshiped, witnessed, learned and worked together. The participants left General Assembly grounded in their/our faith, energized for justice and with resources to bring this work home to their congregations. On so much of what happened at this Justice GA, we will be hearing more from FUUSA's delegates in the coming weeks and months. And, as delegates, they participated in the following actions and other business of the GA.

New CSAI. The General Assembly passed a new four year Congregational Study/Action Issue (CSAI) on *Reproductive Justice: Expanding Our Social Justice Calling.* It responded to the realization that reproductive rights and health services are seriously under attack nationally. Reproductive Justice represents a broader analysis of racial,

economic, cultural, and structural constraints on women's power. The right to have children, to not have children, and to parent children in safe and healthy environments is a human right. This will lead to the 2016 General Assembly voting on a Statement of Conscience. Read more at: http://www.uua.org/statements/current/189638.shtml.

The UUA is halfway through another four-year CSAI, "Immigration as a Moral Issue." Read more at http://www.uua.org/immigration/re/moral/index.shtml.

What is a congregational study/action issue? It is a four year process in which the UUA General Assembly (composed of delegates from the member congregations of the UUA) choose a particular issue with the expectation that it will be studied and acted upon at all levels, particularly at the congregational level, and will culminate in a Statement of Conscience which will serve as a guide for actions at all levels beginning with the Association down to the congregation.

Repudiating the "Doctrine of Discovery". The delegates voted to repudiate the "Doctrine of Discovery," the centuries-old legal doctrine that declared indigenous peoples subject to the Christian explorers who "discovered" them. The resolution called the doctrine "a relic of colonialism, feudalism, and of religious, cultural, and racial biases having no place in the modern day treatment of indigenous peoples globally and indigenous nations of North American and the Hawaiian kingdom." Heard the announcement of the establishment of a College of Social Justice. This is a formal collaboration of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC). Its mission is to increase the capacity of Unitarian Universalists to catalyze justice. Building on several years of successful UUA-UUSC partnership, especially in the area of disaster response, the College will combine the resources of both organizations to offer current leaders and future activists of any age a broader and

more effective portfolio of service learning and justice education experiences. Initially, the program will be developed under the leadership of the Rev. Kathleen McTigue as its inaugural Director. The hand slap

Normally I do not pay much attention to professional basketball but this year I got sucked into the NBA playoffs. They began in April and were not done until June. The athleticism and skill of the players was amazing. The excitement of some of the close games was palpable, even though I was not in the arena. As the teams left the floor one of the rituals was for fans to reach out their hands for a "hand slap" with the players.

Once we got to Phoenix for Justice General Assembly (GA), I forgot about the playoffs. With 15 fellow FUUSAns and over 3,800 other UUs, there was an electric energy. We were there to focus on Justice and to live out our beliefs with action. The opening for Saturday's worship service began:

"We are here to Witness for Justice for the People of Arizona.

We are here to Witness for Justice for the People of every State in these United States.

We are here to shine a light on the Inhumanity of Tent City."

During GA, information was shared about immigration issues at numerous workshops, backpacks for immigrant children were packed, immigration forms were completed for over 500 people, many immigration rights groups were supported with donations and purchases from their booths in the exhibit hall. All of these activities culminated with a witness event outside the Maricopa County "tent city" detention center. This notorious center, built by County Sheriff Joe Arpaio, is where 2,000 men and women are held in tents throughout the 115 degree summer heat and 40 degree winter cold. Our witness event was held to support the immigrants inside by letting them know that they are not forgotten and to draw attention to the inhumane conditions of their detention.

By Saturday afternoon we were pumped up and ready to go witness that evening. Then we heard some of the details. There would be counter demonstrators. They would be carrying guns. That is legal in Arizona. The Sheriff had cancelled all family visits to the jail and detention center for the

day. Extra sheriff personnel would be on duty. Even though we were going at 9:00 PM, it would still be close to 100 degrees. Bring water and keep drinking. Ignore the counter demonstrators. Do not argue with them no matter what they say. Stay together and remain respectful. Wear your Standing on the "Side of Love" T-shirts. There would not be enough room on the buses for all of us. There would be a gathering within the convention center at the same time in solidarity with those demonstrating. The Phoenix Police Department would provide security.

After some discussion, most of us decided to go to the witness. We boarded the school buses outside the convention center. We were all afraid. No one was sure what would happen. On each bus there were two chaplains. They reviewed the behavior rules. Then we sang songs. Before arriving at the jail, they shared a meditation with us.

We unloaded from the buses and walked to the street in front of tent city. There were UU monitors who guided us past the counter demonstrators. (Dave Munro and the other monitors did a great job.) We clearly outnumbered the counter demonstrators. There was a stage set up in the street. We got there on one of the first buses so we were near the stage. The Sheriff had set up yellow police tape between the sidewalk and the open area in front of the jail. We were told to stay off the sidewalk. On the other side of the tape were armed sheriff officers. Four horse patrol officers were there.

As the buses kept coming, the sea of yellow shirts grew. Eventually, there were about 2,500 of us there. Each of us was given an electric candle to hold. Standing on the Side of Love Signs were passed out. We waved our candles and sang. We listened to short speeches on why we were there. They told us that the people inside tent city could hear us and knew they were not forgotten. We drank our water. One speaker said, "At the animal shelter down the street they have air conditioning for the animals. Why does Arpaio treat his detainees worse?" Then we chanted, "Tear tent city down".

As we left, we were given a card telling us what we could do next to change the system. I took the card. We walked by two Phoenix police officers as

we headed back to the bus. They said, "Thank you for coming." We walked by a number of local people and children of color holding handmade signs -- "Close Tent City" and "Justice for All". Some of the children held out their hands. I knew what to do. I started giving hand slaps. They smiled and more hands were held out. We connected for a moment. They said, "Thank you." I said, "Gracias". It meant more than being a basketball fan.--Chuck

I returned from Justice General Assembly, excited about the possibilities and imperatives of service work in our religious education program.

As I have learned at GA and other places, service work becomes religious education when we educate ourselves before the work, and engage in reflection afterwards. I have found a project for you to engage in service work, if you like, at FUUSA through FOCUS food pantry this summer. And I'd like to help you not only engage in volunteerism as a family, but also help you as you work to be the primary religious educators of your children.

Here are the details of the service opportunity:

Perhaps you've heard that this year FUUSA is the collection and distribution site for the FOCUS on Schools project, which is run by the FOCUS Interfaith Food Pantry. Now through August, FOCUS will be working to get school supplies to the children who use the Food Pantry. That way, those families' food money can continue to buy them food.

There are three ways to participate in the service project.

- 1. Donate school supplies for children (see school supplies list on page 8.)
- 2. Volunteer during one of more Packing Days to assemble packages for the grade levels

I have information available for you to educate yourselves about the project - brochures from FO-CUS on their Breakfast Program and Food Pantry. Becca also recommends that you visit the Hunger Action Network website,

www.hungeractionnys.org, for more information on hunger and poverty in NY. I suggest that you read through this material and present the topics that are appropriate for your aged children.

I also have a set of open-ended questions for you to use with your children to reflect on your experiences. (These are adapted from the new Tapestry of Faith curriculum we'll be using with the 4th grade class this fall - Sing to the Power.) These questions are appropriate for any age child or youth. Let me know if you'd like this document or the brochures from FOCUS.

I hope that this project will be meaningful for your family. Let me know if you'd like the informational and reflection materials. I welcome your questions about the learning/service/reflection model for religious education and I'd also very much like to hear what the experience was like for your family afterwards.
