Sam's Outlook

Seeking truth and deeper meaning in small groups at FUUSA

Participating in our Sunday morning service is a great way to feel connected, experience uplift and joy, affirm core values, and be stimulated toward growth and development. An-



other way our congregation provides that experience is in a small group setting. Except when singing or repeating a responsive reading, each person's unique voice isn't usually heard during the Sunday service. In the small group setting however, each individual voice contributes to the discussion. Each individual voice is critical to opening up a topic or helping the participants go deeper into it.

At our annual meeting in May, we reaffirmed our first congregational purpose: to seek truth and deeper meaning. We do that seeking here in community. One of the best ways we've found to do that seeking is in a small group setting.

The three primary ways we do that seeking currently are as follows:

Small Group Ministry - These groups meet twice a month using a topic selected by the group as a starting place for conversation. These groups are focused on sharing personal experiences, questions and insights connected with the topic chosen by the group. Becky Myer coordinates these groups.

Meaning Matters - Much like Small Group Ministry, Meaning Matters also focuses on sharing personal experiences, questions and insights. The difference is the topic is connected with the Sunday services theme for the month. The groups use a monthly packet of material including links to articles, videos,

books and movies on the theme that can be used in preparation for the meeting. The meetings are more directed toward exploring the theme as a source for seeking truth and deeper meaning. It also meets once a month rather than twice a month. Rev. Sam Trumbore coordinates these groups.

Wellspring - This program requires a 10 month commitment (September - June) to meet twice a month to go through a specific curriculum that is designed to promote personal growth and development. There will be specific (usually short) reading requirements before meetings. Also, participants must agree to develop a daily spiritual practice and work monthly with a spiritual advisor. Dave Munro coordinates these groups.

The Sunday service is our home base for connecting with our community and the Unitarian Universalist tradition that brings us together. Small Group Ministry and Meaning Matters are great programs for people who are new to our congregation and want to get connected as well as begin their inner development work. These programs are also great places for more seasoned members of our congregation to renew their inner work and connect with newer people in our congregation. Wellspring is reserved for people who want to make a more serious, dedicated commitment to inner growth and development. All three are offered to support our mission of seeking truth and deeper meaning for our members and to guide our work in the world.

Please consider participating in a small group this year as part of participating in our congregation. These experiences are open to everyone, whether or not you are a member. See registration information on Wellspring and Meaning Matters elsewhere in this newsletter. Watch for Small Group Ministry information in future newsletters.

Summer Session of Religious Education for Children and Youth runs through Aug 31. Board notes

Love reaches out–General Assembly 2014

At the end of June, more than 4700 Unitarian Universalists gathered in Providence, Rhode Island for General Assembly. Our congregation was represented by 29 members, including two youth representatives. Some of us could only participate for a day or two, but more than half of us stayed for the whole time, including two youth representatives.

The GA theme of "Love Reaches Out" resonated in every day's programming. I

was moved by a music director who started a community family choir; a congregation that promotes individual "Growth through Service;" a UU minister who founded a community center, free pantry and community garden in a poor rural community; and stories of other congregations that are looking beyond their church walls to create new kinds of religious communities.

Our worship services were filled with inspiring words and music. We sang, laughed, listened, clapped and sat in silent meditation, together with thousands of UUs.

In the business portion of General Assembly, our eight delegates and Rev. Sam represented our congregation in electing trustees of the Unitarian Universalist Association and amending the bylaws to reflect the emergence of geographically larger regions. We also passed a resolution to fully <u>divest</u> the UU Common Endowment Fund from holdings in the 200 major fossil fuel companies within the next five years. The UUA may retain some shares in order to engage in shareholder activism.

Social witness is another important part of GA. In Providence, we voted to select "<u>Escalating Inequality</u>" as the Congregational Study/Action Issue that congregations will be encouraged to study, reflect and act upon over the next four years. The proposers of this issue called on us to challenge extreme inequality, describing it as a moral imperative for a tradition like ours that values justice, equity and compassion in human relations.

We also approved three <u>Actions of Immediate Witness</u>: to support the summit on stopping deportations in Washington DC that will take place this week; to affirm our congregational commitment to gun violence prevention; and to support the <u>"New Underground Railroad"</u> in Uganda to safely extract LBGT people from persecution.

We heard from Sister Simone, of the "Nuns on the Bus" social justice tour. She told of a videographer on the tour who said to Sister Simone, "It seems like whenever there is trouble, you seem to walk towards it; most people run away." Sister Simone said: "I realized that all of our spiritual leaders, when there are broken hearts or pain in our world, they have walked towards it. They walk towards the pain in order to embrace, touch, heal. If the high level leaders do that, isn't that the witness that we all try to follow?"

Love reaches out! Come to the service on Sunday, August 24 to hear more about what we brought back from General Assembly.

Growing Together

Are you interested in Wellspring?

There are spaces available for the introductory Wellspring program, now known as **UU Wellspring** – **Foundation**, a rich spiritual deepening experience that we have conducted at FUUSA for five years now. The introductory curriculum guides participants through an exploration of the historical roots of our faith, our philosophical influences such as Transcendentalism, Buddhism and Humanism, and what our UU faith tells us about human nature and what we are called to do in the world. We explore and reflect upon these subjects in the safe, covenant-guided environment we share with other like-minded FUUSAns.

The Wellspring program requires a commitment to a daily spiritual practice of one's own choosing, monthly meetings with a spiritual director (self-selected from a vetted list), readings from carefully selected sermons and writings of the luminaries of our faith and related traditions, and meetings at FUUSA twice a month from Sept. 16 through June (first and third Tuesdays).

This year's introductory Wellspring program will be

co-facilitated by Sharon Babala and Karen Kaufmann.
