Construction Corner redux

Significant renovations to Channing Hall are now virtually complete, and at a very low cost. Here's the story.

- ◆The old nametag rack/SRC storage cupboard was removed this summer. The materials were re-cycled, providing most of the wood needed to build new folding chair storage racks in the chair storage area off the Sanctuary foyer.
- ◆Channing Hall, the new chair storage area, and the Washington Avenue window seat were painted.
- ◆A picture rail was installed, consisting of **Construction, continued on pg. 2**

Board Notes

DPA! DPA! No, this is not a new acronym – but it is what your Board of Trustees accomplished at their November 19th meeting when the focus was on FUUSA's financial well-being and projections for repaying our mortgage loans.

The "D" represents "dream." the table in B-8 the Board focused on the projections for the financial health of our congregation into 2031! It felt like the invisible faces of FUUSA's future were also sitting at that table - and they were giving thanks to us, their fore-sisters and forebrothers, as they recognized and acknowledged our foresight and planning for our congregation's financial future. Who knows? Maybe this FUUSA congregation of the future will be experiencing such growth and financial solvency that they'll be planning new satellite congregations or their next purchase and renovation to accommodate a thousand members!

"P" is for "planning" which was what

this 2009-10 Board was actually doing at the table as they worked on the best strategy for paying down the mortgage. Treasurer Betsey Miller gave a thorough update on the mortgage which included its history, budget projections (based on income and expense assumptions), and concerns about meeting the amount of debt service that will grow in the "out" years. Betsey presented a realistic view of the positive and negative sides of the equation and offered several ways to address the need to update and sustain a solid plan. She and the Finance Committee have clearly had their noses to the grindstone (ouch!) on the issues of building finance.

"A" is for "action." After listening to Betsey's presentation and poring over the various spread sheets and charts, the decision was made to support the Finance Committee's recommendations to increase the amount paid in debt service from the annual operating budget by \$3000 per year for the

- ◆ Construction, cont. from pg. 1 wood provided by Reese Satin, which he had recycled from a neighbor's project of several years ago.
- ♦Bulletin boards were purchased from Huck Finn's Warehouse at a huge discount; List price \$99, cost us only \$32 each.
- ♦ New acoustical ceiling tiles were donated and delivered by Bunkoff General Contractors, the contractor that built Emerson Community Hall. (That's a neat story all by itself.)
- ♦A bit of a dust-up happened concerning insurance coverage when we rented the scissor lift (used to install ceiling tiles). With the assistance of our insurance agent, we changed FUUSA's insurance carrier. The new policy saves FUUSA about \$400 per year, enough to pay the rental cost for the lift! Might this be called collateral advantage?

Total cost for the project was well under \$500, plus lots of sweat equity. --Dave Metz

Chris' Chrysalis

This month I'd like to respond to some feedback I received after my most recent sermon, "My Arranged Marriage" on November 29. In that sermon I spoke of my past involvement with the Unification Church, and referred to the Reverend Sun Myung Moon as "my spiritual guide" – a remark that became the topic of some conversation during the coffee hour. In the time since that sermon, some of you have asked me to elaborate more on what I meant by that remark

Let me begin with some reflections on an adult religious education course I taught recently at FUUSA. The course was called "Spiritual Autobiography: Nurturing your Faith within the Six Sources of Unitarian Universalism." The class met for six weeks, and we spent time on themes like "honoring teachers," "journeys," and "epiphanies." An important objective of the course was to help the class claim the positives from our religious past and make connections with Unitarian Universalist principles and commitments. To facilitate this I invited members of FUUSA to come and talk about their journey and make a personal connection to one of the six sources of our faith. In this way, we began to discover in our own religious journeys a sense of continuity, an essential component of any spiritual autobiography. In the context of the course, I considered any teacher on our religious journey a "spiritual guide."

I have been doing some work lately to discover a sense of continuity in my own religious journey, reflect on spiritual guides, and craft my own spiritual autobiography. In the three months I have been an intern minister here at FUUSA, I have given three sermons--"War Baby, Soul Man" in August and "Faith without Certainty" in October, and "My Arranged Marriage" in November. I have honored a number of teachers. Some are well known: Bruce Lee, the Buddha, Jesus Christ, Martin Luther King, Jr., Thich Nhat Hanh. Others may not be so well know to you, but would still be included on my list: the Roman Catholic theologian Paul Knitter, the Reverend Kay Greenleaf, now retired from the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Poughkeepsie, my wife Mitsuko, and our very own Reverend Sam Trumbore! These people, along with many others, have served as guides for me on my own spiritual journey.

We Unitarian Universalists claim that "The living tradition we share draws from many sources." In fact, we identify six sources. Perhaps what I mean by spiritual guide is best captured in the second: Words and deeds of prophetic women and men which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love.

As I write this column I am mindful that today is "Pearl Harbor Day." Mitsuko, my partner of twelve years, is Japanese. The Rev. Moon, our matchmaker, has had this prophetic role for me. He showed me a practical way to embody Jesus' teaching "love the enemy." To call him my spiritual guide means I honor him as my teacher. I do not follow any teacher in blind obedience, or necessarily believe in everything the teacher believes. But do we need to be in agreement in order to learn from and grow with one another? I certainly hope not.

I challenge you to examine your religious past and claim the positives. Who are your spiritual guides? Which prophetic women and men have challenged you? What lessons do you cherish? What have you discarded? Make connections between the places you have been, and where you are now. Find continuity in your journey. In the process, throw out the bathwater; but keep the baby!



Dec. 27 "Beyond Innocence," The Rev. David Weissbard

The turning of the year is a point at which evaluation and re-evaluation of our direction comes naturally. I am among those who believe that we, as a nation, are disabled in that process by what some have referred to as our "pseudo-innocence." You can't get somewhere different if you don't know where you are. On this Sunday between Christmas and the New Year, I'll be making some suggestions about that disability.
