Fellowship celebration expands!

You should have received your invitation for the Annual Fellowship Dinner this week. (If you didn't get it, call the office to request one!) The Annual Fellowship Dinner Committee has been planning a number of changes this year to encourage attendance by all FUUSA members and friends. One change is for everyone: we've added a place on the RSVP for you to request someone you'd like to sit with. As always, the committee will make seat assignments, but now you can request one or more folks you'd like to have at your table. (Spouses/partners can decide between themselves if they want to sit at the same table—we're very accommodating!)

Also new this year, as an encourage-

ment for parents of young children to attend, we will be providing free childcare at the Century House (site of the Dinner) for children 5 and under. Parents can bring their young children to the Century House, enjoy the fellowship and the dinner, while knowing that their children are near by.

If there is enough interest, and if it will enable parents to attend the Annual Fellowship Dinner, we will also be providing free childcare at FUUSA for children between the ages of 6 and 14. This childcare will be a supervised event with food and activities. Parents would drop their children at FUUSA and then pick them up after the Dinner.

Board Notes

Highlights of the February Board of Trustees meeting included keeping our eye on the Strategic Plan through reports from the Canvass Committee and the Staffing Task Force, and hearing a presentation from the Safe Congregation Task Force on the progress of their work.

The Canvass Committee reported on the timing challenges of having the Annual Dinner scheduled late in April this year; therefore, the Canvass "kick off" will be Sunday, March 21. Representatives from the Board will join canvass chair Peter Brown to deliver the message connecting our growing sense of community and our vision for the future with our current and long term needs. It is indeed an exciting time for FUUSA!

The recently created Staffing Task Force presented a conceptual diagram of the present structure of FUUSA. While the

congregation is central to our organizational structure and has final authority in most governance matters, the minister, the Board, the Councils and various committees have considerable responsibility and autonomy. Our current structure is the starting point for future discussions on organization, governance, and the needs of a growing congregation. Stay tuned.

A good deal of the February meeting was devoted to hearing from the Safe Congregation Task Force, which was appointed by the Board last May. The Task Force was charged with reviewing the issues of concern which have impeded full implementation of the policy as now written, continuing to educate the congregation and facilitate conversations about the policy, and make recommendations on issues still pending. Jean Poppei, chair, was joined by Patti Jo Newell, who

also serves on the Task Force, in making the presentation and answering questions from the Board. It was emphasized by those who were present at the Safe Congregation World Café in January, conducted by the Task Force, that dialog around many of the issues has moved considerably toward consensus; and that although there are still differences of opinion, there has been a demonstrated willingness within the congregation to appreciate and understand a variety of viewpoints.

The Task Force will be submitting a written report and recommendations to the Board in the near future. The Board recognizes that this work has been complex and at times difficult. Linda thanked the Task Force for their efforts on behalf of both the Board and the congregation.

Reminders: Minutes of Board Meetings are posted in Channing Hall, and all members of the Board of Trustees invite your questions, comments or concerns at any time.

Call for projects seeking Endowment Trust funding

In accordance with the Bylaws, the Endowment Trust reports that at the end of 2009, it had assets totaling \$688,752.20. The bulk of this amount is represented by the \$575,000 non-interest bearing loan made for FUUSA's building construction. Of the remaining \$113,752, \$86,325 was invested in various mutual funds, \$15,000 in an interest-bearing loan to the Community Loan Fund, \$7,900 in an interest-bearing loan to the Honest Weight Food Coop., and \$4,527 in an interest-bearing cash account.

At the beginning of 2009, the total value of the Trust was \$651,440. During 2009, the Trust received \$9,080 in contributions. Thus, the total value of the Trust increased slightly during 2009 from (\$651,440+9,080) = \$660,520 to \$688,752 or about four percent, excluding inflation.

The Endowment Trustees have adopted a new grant capacity calculation which meets bylaw requirements for maintaining the Trust's inflation-corrected principal, while permitting grants to be made, even in years

where there is a loss in total trust value. (For further details see any Endowment Trustee.) This year, the Trustees have decided to make up to about \$700 in grants for projects that meet the following criteria:

1. *degree to which a project or expense promotes FUUSA's mission;*
2. *unavailability of funds from other sources;*
3. *amount available for granting in a particular grant cycle;*
4. *relative merit of an application compared to other competing applications during a grant cycle.*

This year competing applications will be accepted until **April 30th** and awards will be made in early May. If funds remain after making these awards, applications will be accepted throughout the remainder of the year. Grant application forms are available on the Board and Announcements bulletin board in Channing Hall. Completed applications should be sent to the Endowment Trust c/o FUUSA, or any of the Endowment Trustees. For additional information contact Reese Satin.

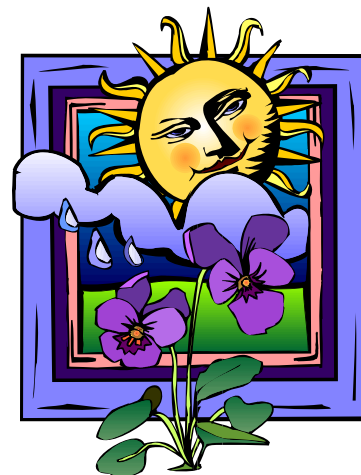
Walker Book Club
