Mar. 20 "On Being Good Without a Higher Authority," Rev. Sam Trumbore

Historically, the Universalists claimed Jesus' death and resurrection meant every last one of us would be saved. The Calvinists strongly objected to this view. "Without the threat of hell, why would people be good?" they asked. In one form or another, many believe that the only reason people will be good is because of a threat of punishment, with God as the ultimate judge. Is that the case? Will some people be good without a threat? Without God? What is your answer?

Mar. 27 "The Authority of Personal Experience," Rev. Sam Trumbore

Unitarian Universalists look to reality for guidance in our religious lives. We rely heavily on our personal experiences and those we trust to orient our moral, ethical and spiritual lives. While many of us are aware of the strengths of this approach, we may be less aware of the weaknesses and pitfalls. Primary among those weaknesses are the limitations of our experiences beyond our own culture, our own class, our own abilities and disabilities, our own religion, our own ethnic or racial background. How can we feel confident in the authority of the guidance of personal experience when comes from a very limited source? Are the universals really universal?

FUUSA chosen as Threshold Congregation

There are 200 Unitarian/Universalist congregations in the Central East Region including Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Ohio, West Virginia, Delaware, Maryland, Northern Virginia, and the District of Columbia. They all had an opportunity to apply to be a Threshold Congregation. Out of these 200 congregations, FUUSA has been selected as one of nine Threshold Congregations. This means that we will be getting special assistance over the next three years from regional UU

staff and consultants as we implement our Strategic Plan.

Before describing what being a Threshold Congregation means I would like to thank the members of the Task Force who prepared our great application -- Peggy Sherman, Dawn Dana, and Dave Street. Also, the Board, Rev. Sam, Linda Way, Dave Munro, and Jacqui Williams provided great input as well. But back to what it means.

Being a Threshold Congregation means that we are ready to break through to the next level of activity and effectiveness. We have a plan and want to move from being good to great.

In our answers to the first two questions on the application to become a Threshold Congregation we said:

Why does your congregation desire to grow?

Many people of varied backgrounds in our region would be attracted to Unitarian Universalism if they knew who we are and what we value. The First Unitarian Universalist Society of Albany aspires to reach out to these individuals and to become a religious home for all in our diverse metropolitan area. A larger membership will advance the mission of our congregation as well as our denominational visibility in the Capital Region.

We recognize that maturational growth within our congregation is just as important as numeric growth in members. Our congregation seeks to achieve stronger connections, deeper meaning and greater impact, serving as a beacon of Unitarian Universalism in the Capital Region. We affirmed goals for growth in community, spirituality and justice work in our strategic plan, adopted one year ago. We long for more community and a deepening of the experience of community. We want to support our members in their personal search for meaning. And we feel called to significant and meaningful social justice work in our larger community.

What would success look like?

We envision deeper commitment and broader en-


gagement among our members, with that growth reflected in indicators such as attendance on Sunday mornings, participation in adult education, volunteer service, and involvement in social justice programs. We hope to better integrate new members and develop future leaders.

We envision embracing multiculturalism by providing programming that is accessible and attractive to diverse members and visitors and by expanding our congregation's anti-racism, anti-oppression and multi-cultural work.

We envision the implementation of a new social justice process, building on the seminar that Rev. Dick Gilbert led for us in November, with increased congregational engagement and greater effectiveness for our efforts.

We envision growth in our organizational capacity, establishing the framework to manage a larger congregation. New governance structures and revised bylaws may be needed. We identified the need for a Governance Task Force as a Next Step in our strategic plan, but have not yet taken that step. We need to strengthen stewardship in our congregation, not just to pay the mortgage, but to support our mission and expanding program. Although our mission statement was reviewed as part of our recent strategic planning process, it could be a more concise expression of who we are and why we exist. Our strategic plan also called for a Covenant of Right Relations to articulate how we strive to relate to each other within our religious community.

Notes from Joy Library

Two new items which may be of interest.

In the Valley of the Shadow: On the Foundations of Religious Belief by James L. Kugel, 2011,. [200.92 KUG]

"TEN YEARS AGO, Harvard professor James Kugel was diagnosed with an aggressive, likely fatal, form of cancer. "I was, of course, disturbed and worried. But the main change in my state of mind was that the background music had suddenly stopped—the music of daily life that's constantly going, the music of infinite time and possibilities. Now suddenly it was gone, replaced by nothing, just silence. There you are, one little person, sitting in the late summer sun, with only a few things left to do."

"Despite his illness, Kugel was intrigued by this new

state of mind and especially the uncanny feeling of human smallness that came with it. There seemed to be something overwhelmingly true about it—and its starkness reminded him of certain themes and motifs he had encountered in his years of studying ancient religions. "This, I remember thinking, was something I should really look into further—if ever I

got the chance."

"In the Valley of the Shadow is the result of that search. In this wide-ranging exploration of different aspects of religion—interspersed with his personal reflections on the course of his own illness—Kugel seeks to uncover what he calls 'the starting point of religious consciousness,'....

"Kugel's look at the whole phenomenon of religious beliefs is a rigorously honest, sometimes skeptical, but ultimately deeply moving affirmation of faith in God. One of our generation's leading biblical scholars has created a powerful meditation on humanity's place in the world and all that matters most in our lives. Believers and doubters alike will be struck by its combination of objective scholarship and poetic insight, which makes for a single, beautifully crafted consideration of life's greatest mystery. Aftershock: The Next Economy and America's Future by Robert B. Reich, 2010, [330.973 REI]

"Reich (Supercapitalism), secretary of labor under Bill Clinton and former economic adviser to President Obama, argues that Obama's stimulus package will not catalyze real recovery because it fails to address 40 years of increasing income inequality. The lessons are in the roots of and responses to the Great Depression, according to Reich, who compares the speculation frenzies of the 1920s—1930s with present-day ones, while showing how Keynesian forerunners like FDR's Federal Reserve Board chair, Marriner Eccles, diagnosed wealth disparity as the leading stress leading up to the Depression. By contrast, sharing the gains of an expanding economy with the middle class brought unprecedented pros-

perity in the postwar decades, as the majority of workers earned enough to buy what they produced. Despite occasional muddled analyses (of the offshoring of industrial production in the 1990s, for example), Reich's thesis is well argued and frighteningly plausible: without a return to the "basic bargain" (that work-

ers are also consumers), the "aftershock" of the Great Recession includes long-term high unemployment and a political backlash--a crisis, he notes with a sort of grim optimism, that just might be painful enough to encourage necessary structural reforms." From Publishers Weekly.

If you went to the Rev. Dick Gilbert workshop in November, you heard Rev. Gilbert relate the allegory of the babies in the water. The villagers kept trying to save the babies by pulling them out of the water, but they could not save them all. Then one of the villagers suggested they go upstream to find out why the babies were in the water. We have many babies in the water and we do many things to help, cook for the homeless shelter, donate to the food pantry and to other worthy causes Here in Albany we do not have to go far to look for the cause.
