Board Notes

The Safe Congregation Policy consumed much of the Board's attention at its April meeting. The length and content of the full title of the policy gives only a clue to the enormous amount of work devoted to this issue by various committee and task force members, staff, interested persons, and the congregation at-large over the past few years. (The policy is entitled Toward a Safe Congregation: Policies for Prevention of Sexual Misconduct, Physical Abuse and Harassment and Guidelines for Responding.) Some background for newcomers...in May, 2008, the Safe Congregation Policy was adopted by the Board with the conditions that an evaluation of the policy would be conducted within a year and additional education and discussion opportunities would be provided for the congregation. Early in that process, concerns were raised regarding several items in the policy including the provision for background checks for persons teaching or working with our youth. Therefore in April,

who not only did the work, but also provided all of the perennials that were used!

On Thursday, April 29, the FUUSA "Susan B. Anthony House" was dedicated and the new owner took over. D'Andrea Brooks is a single, working mom with several kids. Rev. Sam was there and spoke for several minutes, wishing the new owner happiness in her new home.

2009, the Board created a Safe Congregation Policy Task Force, which included persons with diverse views to address the concerns raised by the congregation. (Members of the Task Force were Jean Poppei, chair, Patti Jo Newell, Reese Satin, Lauren Tobias and Winston Hagborg.)

Patti Jo Newell, joined by Jean Poppei and Reese Satin, presented the Task Force Report to the Board and valuable discussion ensued. It was agreed that the report of the Task Force will be included in the Annual Report and that the full policy annotated in detail by the committee will be sent to the Board and made available to anyone in the congregation interested in the longer document. (Contact the office, if interested.) The Board thanked the Task Force for what has been a long, comprehensive process and its very difficult, but ultimately very productive, work.

Therefore the Board voted to change line 5005 of the proposed 2010-11 budget from "part time assistant minister" to "implementation of Strategic Plan."
