

Board takes three significant actions

At the April Board meeting motions were passed adopting the <u>Toward a Safe Congregation Policy</u> and establishing a Lifespan Learning Committee. Copies of the Policy are available on the FUUSA web site. The next step as we begin implementing the policy is to establish the Safe Congregation Response Team (SCRT.) SCRT members will include the Minister, the DRE, one Board of Trustees member, one Religious Education Council member, and two additional members from the FUUSA community. Once appointed, the SCRT will work on developing an implementation plan.

The Board appointed Jane Lax as chair of the Lifespan Learning Committee. The Committee is charged with facilitating and coordinating lifespan learning opportunities to promote ongoing growth and development within our congregation. The committee will create a Lifespan Learning program plan to present to the Board and an annual committee report and budget request. The Lifespan Learning Committee will work in conjunction with other FUUSA committees, leadership and individual members to facilitate and coordinate adult learning classes, workshops and programming at FUUSA in response to current initiatives and identified needs. The Lifespan Learning Committee will support and assist the Director of Religious Education and the REC to facilitate and coordinate multi-generational and inter-generational learning opportunities.

Winston Hagborg, Unsung Hero

The Unsung Hero award recognizes members of our congregation who work on projects behind the scenes and whose volunteer work has occurred over a number of years in a variety of capacities. Today we are honoring Winston Hagborg for his deep commitment to our congregation's children and youth.

Winston Hagborg and Deborah Dewey and their daughter Heather came to the Capital Region from Brooklyn where they attended the Unitarian Universalist church. When Winston got a job in Chatham, he and Deborah began looking for a congregation for their family.

Once they found FUUSA Winston started and kept teaching in our religious education program. He taught Heather's class from the time that she was seven until middle school. He took a year off when their second daughter Hayley was born but then came back to teaching RE and has taught ever since.

By Winston's count it's 22 years of teaching religious education at FUUSA.

Ann D'Attillio, our Religious Education Director Emerita, thinks of Winston not only as a good teacher, which he was and is, but as someone with a quality that RE directors especially prize. She could always rely on Winston to volunteer and he would unfailingly follow through on every one of his commitments.

RE teaching team some years ago. He was always completely prepared for the class and worked with our lively classroom group to navigate the lesson and draw out its meaning in a calm, respectful way. I had a lot to learn from him.

Winston also made the additional commitment and took the special training to serve on a teaching team for About Your Sexuality. As the parent of two sons who went through AYS, I offer heartfelt thanks to you and your colleagues.

Today, after attending another special training workshop over several days, Winston is a member of the teaching team for Our Whole Lives. Our seventh and eighth graders are participating in OWL, which is designed not only to equip them with accurate information about human development, sexual health, behavior and relationships, but also to help them clarify their values. Winston applauds this emphasis on informed and responsible decision-making. According to his teaching colleagues, the kids respond to Winston because he is such a good listener.

Winston has used his skills and experience to serve our congregation in a number of other ways.

He worked on our Safe Congregation policy from the very inception of that effort several years ago. His level-headed approach helped the committee focus on its goals. This important and challenging effort recently reached its culmination with the adoption of the policy by the Board.

Winston enjoyed serving as a mentor in our Rite of

Passage program for youth. His daughters both participated in the program and Deborah followed Winston in becoming a mentor.

Winston served a term on the Religious Education Council. Although he admits to something that is seen as out of character for a UU: he does not enjoy serving on committees.

A generation of children and their families know Winston as a religious education teacher at FUUSA, but few of them probably know that in his life outside FUUSA Winston is a school psychologist for the Chatham Central School District. He earned a master's degree from University of Pennsylvania and a doctoral degree from Temple University. He's continued to publish articles through his professional career.

When Winston heard that he had been selected as one of FUUSA's Unsung Heroes, he was characteristically modest. He spoke about the great support that RE volunteers get from the church and singled out Leah for her help. And his biggest concern was getting back to class, to be there for our youth and his colleagues on the teaching team, because they are counting on him.

We have counted on Winston for many years of quiet volunteerism. Thank you, Winston, for your service, commitment and leadership on behalf of our congregation's children and youth.

Forum

On **May 22**, our Forum speaker will be **Richard Smith**, an expert on re-entry programs for formerly incarcerated individuals who until recently was Director of Re-entry at the Center for Law and Justice. Richard will discuss existing programs to assist re-entry and how we can contribute to community strategies that assist the successful transition of the formerly incarcerated.

Crash Course Continued

This is a follow-up to Chris Martenson's Crash Course but that is not a prerequisite to participate in these discussions. 

We encourage you to pick up your name tag from your church on Sunday, May 29th, and bring it with you to the Auditorium on the 5th.


Breakfast Before the Service?
