## Sam's Outlook

### Inspiring urgency rather than despair

The greater our awareness of the forces at work in the world, the greater one is tempted to despair of any hope for humanity. Much as my emotional self urges me to look the other way, I continue to pay close attention about what we are learning about the effects of human activity on our planet. This can be quite distressing at times.

I learned about the most recent terrors listening to a new favorite science podcast, the CBC radio show *Quirks and Quarks* (<http://www.cbc.ca/quirks/>). It is an excellent review of what is new and exciting in the world of science and technology. Their first show of the fall season (<http://www.cbc.ca/quirks/archives/09-10/qq-2009-09-12.html>) was titled "Oceans of Trouble."

Now, when I think of the oceans, I think of their vastness. Believing we can have a major impact seems remote - but I discovered how wrong I was. I knew about the dead zone at the mouth of the Mississippi river without marine life. Too much plant fertilizer washes down from the fields up-stream and stimulates algal growth. When those creatures bloom and die, bacteria eat them and suck all the oxygen out of the wa-

ter, killing everything and creating dead zones for thousands of square miles. I learned that these zones number over 300 around the globe at the mouths of major rivers.

I knew corals were in trouble due primarily to temperature changes in the waters. The algae in the coral give it its color, a symbiotic relationship. When the delicate balance of the water temperature and chemistry changes, the relationship becomes unbalanced and the coral expel the algae. I knew we're over-fishing the oceans, driving species into collapse. What I hadn't considered in both cases were the far-reaching effects on other species that depend on the diversity of sea life. We're only beginning to grasp the kind of disruption we're wreaking.

I knew the ocean was one of the major sinks for all the carbon dioxide we're putting in the air. The oceans are a big reason why CO2 hasn't risen as fast as the amount we're dumping into the air. I learned something absolutely terrifying. The ph (acid vs. base) chemistry of seawater is changing all **Sam's Outlook, continued on pg. 3**

## From the President

### No Triskaidekaphobia\* at FUUSA....or...Happy Homecoming:

On Sunday, September 13, Emerson was full, smiles and joyful greetings were everywhere, and our water ceremony reflected summer travels of the congregation from backyards to Copenhagen. While summer services were extremely successful, there is still palpable excitement in September about the start of the new church year. This fall is especially exciting – and opening day was especially busy - as we also held the kick-off event for our major marketing campaign with the Capital Region Unitarian Universalists of New York (CRUUNY.)

**Shout It Out!:** CRUUNY launched our Shout It Out media campaign at a lively and fun filled celebration at the First Unitarian Society of Schenectady on September 13. Balloons and noisemakers, Matt Edwards' band, *Buck2Fifty*, and the cut-loose dancing of, among others, Rev. Sam Trumbore and Rev. Linda Hoddy, made for a festive event! In addition, Rev. Tom Chulak, our St. Lawrence District Executive, and Valerie Holton, the UUA marketing consultant who has been working with our four congregations since last year, outlined the specifics of the planned campaign.

For those who may be newcomers to us, CRUUNY consists of the four UU Congregations of the capital district region: Albany, Schenectady, Saratoga and Glens Falls. Last spring we collectively raised over \$20,000 for an area-wide media campaign to "shout it out" and let folks know who we are and what we offer as open-minded, welcoming and inclusive religious communities. We know there are those out there who would join us – IF they knew about us – and that, in a nutshell, is why we are launching this campaign. Market research has shown that far too many people have no idea who we are; others do know some-

thing about us and are even attuned to our liberal values, but have never found our doors or been invited in – and thus are denied the saving message and caring community we offer. We hope to change that!

**The Media Campaign Begins:** Our campaign will be conducted through print media, radio, direct mail, and on line. While the UUA has provided tremendous assistance in developing materials, thanks also go to the marketing folks in each congregation – including for us, Bruce Smith, Al DeSalvo, and publicity chair, Paula Moskowitz. Kudos to all! A few details on the campaign:

Radio spots have already begun on WAMC! A couple examples of what you might hear are: *The Unitarian Universalist Congregations of the Capital Region – Where people of different beliefs worship as one faith... or... The Unitarian Universalist Congregations of the Capital Region - teaching children to build bridges, not walls, in our increasingly multi-cultural world.* Our underwriting "buy" provides for seven spots per week at random times between 5AM and 9PM and runs for 26 weeks over the next 12 months. Each spot also directs the listener to CRUUNY's new website: [www.capitalregionuu.org](http://www.capitalregionuu.org). This new website is bright, attractive, and informative; it includes a number of photographs and lists the individual websites of our four congregations. Do listen for these ads on WAMC and check out the CRUUNY website - both will make you smile with pride and expectation!

Another on-line advertising tool we have purchased is Google AdWords. Most of us have noticed that when we search for something on Google, we often get "Sponsored Links" listed on one side of the page. These sponsored links have been triggered by specific words or phrases

from someone doing a Google search. For example someone searching for "churches without creeds" or "churches for interfaith couples" may now find on their results page and listed as a "Sponsored Link," [www.capitalregionuu.org](http://www.capitalregionuu.org). Now that's 21st century marketing!

The CRUUNY campaign is also using direct mail. This week we will be mailing 20,000 oversized and colorful postcards headlined "Imagine a religion that embraces many different beliefs...including yours" and again directs people to our websites and to our four congregations. This is a carefully targeted mailing to approximately 12% of the households in specific zip codes identified by each congregation. You may or may not fit the targeted profile; you may or may not get a postcard yourself; one neighbor may get one, another may not. We do know, however, that the UUA has had both extensive experience and proven success with direct mail advertising. So, if you do get a postcard, consider passing it on to someone else – someone, perhaps, you have been meaning to invite to FUUSA. For as valuable as marketing can be, personally asking and bringing a friend is still more effective! Let's all "shout it out" in whatever way we can!

**Reminder: Welcoming is the Task of All of Us:** Given the media campaign outlined above, we can expect an increased number of visitors in the coming weeks and months. Are we ready? The building looks terrific, RE is fully staffed and geared up, and our membership coordinator and membership committee have worked hard to be prepared. But welcoming is a task for all of us! We can all do something! Sign up to be a greeter, say hello to newcomers, help visitors find their way. No one is shy in his or her own house; we are all hospitable to guests in our home; and, for most **President , continued on pg. 3**

over the world as the CO2 dissolves into the water, making carbonic acid. Chemistry dictates all living creatures can survive only in a narrow pH range. If seawater were to become too acidic, it will disrupt all life and potentially kill all ocean creatures. We're moving that way very fast and the momentum of the amount of carbon dioxide in the air is huge.

No scientist had ever considered until recently that we could have this big of an impact on the oceans. Now it looks almost unavoidable. The scientists who discovered this are not a happy bunch of people. Contemplating the end of all life in the oceans and fearing that there may not be any way to avoid it doesn't make you want to get out of bed in the morning.

I feel torn about passing on this

information in my column. We need to know that our carbon emissions are directly related to the potential for the oceans to die. And knowing this is emotionally overwhelming. We can hope to be wrong but it doesn't look like that right now, far from it.

My hope is that by raising your awareness, you'll receive the message that this is urgent. The drastic reduction of carbon emissions is mandatory for the survival of numberless life forms. None of us acting alone can make any difference. But collectively, as a global community, there is the potential for hope.

Science points the way. We need to pay attention and demand a global response.

# Religious Exploration

## Why do they come?

I write this on the evening of our first day Sunday school of the traditional year. As Rev. Sam remarked upon seeing the wave of scurrying humanity coming forward at Children's Time, there were many familiar faces this morning – some we've seen throughout the summer, and others had changed since we last saw them. And there were many new faces too. Everyone was excited - whether it was a gleeful or nervous kind of excitement. Surely they were wondering what would happen next. I was at the back of the hall, amazed and excited too, donning my "Eliot Pricklepuss the Porcupine" costume. I wasn't entirely sure what would happen next either. Would the skit be well received? Would I remember my lines? Would all those children find their classrooms easily after we left the hall? How were the youth doing in their groups downstairs? Then a seemingly stray thought entered my brain - Why do children and youth come to FUUSA on Sunday morning?

The most obvious reason children and youth come here, since we don't see any little ones getting off a CDTA bus on their own or biking by themselves down Wash. Ave, is that a family member or adult friend brings them here. But once here, what do they hope for?

My guess is that they want at the least, to sing a song they know and to hear a good story in the service. And then in Sunday school, as a 5th grader reported to his teacher today, they want not to be bored. What a low bar!

From my observations and conversations with children and youth, I think they really want the same things I hear a lot of adults say they want from their Sunday morning experience. We all want to be with friends and to have a chance to talk about

things we can't talk about with our friends during the week. We all want to ask questions; to share our stories; to move; to sing; to engage in rituals in order to make meaning of events in our lives; to feel accepted, valued and empowered; to have opportunities to work with others to do good in the world.

That's asking a lot to ask our Sunday School teachers! The RE Council and I are working to evaluate the curricula, provide new courses and enrich older ones. But that is only the "what" of Sunday school. There is also the "how". As UU's I think we are much more about the "how" than the "what". For us the content of the week's lesson is more of a springboard to get things going than an end goal. Religious education is primarily about relationships and how we treat each other. For us, the thinking and the experiences are closely intertwined. And so I try to support the teachers by also giving them resources to nurture and model kindness, acceptance, compassion and respect in their classrooms. I also encourage teachers to challenge children and youth and to be open to the challenges the youth and children offer. This is how we learn and grow. It's how we each develop our ideas of how to be in the world – our personal faith or philosophy.

Just as the "how" and the "what" are closely intertwined, so is learning and worship. Each Sunday school session includes ritual. Usually everyone has a "circle time" with chalice lighting, opportunities for sharing stories, and a message through a story or reading. The monthly Children's Chapel that I lead includes a message or lesson along with rituals like the chalice lighting, joys and sorrows, singing, meditation or prayer, and readings. Rev. Sam and I plan our multigenerational services to include

many elements to combine the "how" and the "what" in ways that are engaging to all.

So here's the bottom line, as I see it. Unitarian Universalist religious education is creating an environment where people feel empowered to travel their path of personal faith or personal philosophy. None of this is easy, but I don't think any of us signed up for the easy route when we became UU's. Certainly UU RE is a challenge worth aspiring to. Because whether our children, youth, or even we adults can articulate this, it goes to the heart of why we come on Sunday mornings.

Here's to another great year of religious education! May we all feel the comfort of support, the awe of empowerment and perhaps some slight discomfort of challenge in order to learn and grow and to be of service to others. Thank you, as always for your support of the RE program.

It helps people train their minds to strengthen concentration and intensify moment-to-moment awareness. Regular practice of this technique quiets and sharpens the mind and opens the heart.





**Oct. 4**      **“Faith without Certainty”** --Chris Antal, Intern Minister

Religious liberals share a commitment to open-ended inquiry and realize that truth is not given once for all time. This commitment is expressed in the UUA covenant to affirm and promote “a free and responsible search for truth and meaning.” Chris Antal will share a critical life incident when his family encountered religious intolerance and how that experience of oppression led him away from a standpoint of religious certitude to a Unitarian Universalist standpoint of exploration.

**Oct. 11**      **“Who Discovered What?”**--The Rev. Sam Trumbore

Most likely, your high school history teacher passed on to you many lies and distortions about American history, starting with Columbus who almost certainly didn't discover the Americas. Exposing these lies is critical to comprehending the legacy of the harmful and unwholesome practices of European settlers. Understanding and acknowledging the damaging effects of that history is critical for creating a more harmonious world.

**Oct. 18**      **“One Congregation: Many Paths”** --The Rev. Sam Trumbore

This expression is the motto of the Cleveland's West Shore UU Church. It expresses simply and beautifully what we are about as Unitarian Universalists. We call it being “non-creedal.” There is no test of belief to participate in or join a UU congregation. But that doesn't mean you can believe anything you want. Come find out what the limits are.

**Oct. 25**      **“Creating Free Will”**--The Rev. Sam Trumbore

Evolutionary Psychology is suggesting that human behavior is completely determined by our genes and our environment. This seems to strike at the heart of the idea of humanity having any free will. Perhaps the evolutionists have over-reached in their triumphal pronouncements. Could free will be created rather than innate or absent? If so, what are the consequences?

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
