SRC Focus on Social Justice

1. Making a difference in the lives of children and families in the city of Albany
2. Becoming a leader in sustainable environmental practices
3. Advocating for public policies that are in line with our UU values and principles. These include:
 - Economic and Racial Justice
 - Environmental Justice
 - Gender and Sexual Justice
 - International Justice and Peacemaking
 - Civil Rights and Religious Liberty
 - Health and Family Justice
4. Direct aid activities (homeless shelter, food pantries, Give Away the Plate collections)

SRC informs the congregation on social issues through:

- Information in *Windows* and *Order of Service*
- Distribution of materials at the SRC table in Channing Hall

The Flaming Chalice design was originally used during WWII as a badge to identify Unitarians who were helping refugees flee Hitler. It became a symbol of risk, service, and freedom and has since been widely adopted by many Unitarian Universalist congregations.



SRC Activities

- Staffing the SRC table which sells Fair Trade items and Central American crafts, and efficient light bulbs
- Initiating petitions, public statements and letter writing on critical issues
- Demonstrating, public witnessing for justice issues, “Standing on the Side of Love”
- Preparing dinner 2 or 3 times monthly for the Emergency Homeless Shelter
- Collecting blankets and warm clothes for the homeless
- Selling items to benefit the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee
- FOCUS assistance (including monthly collections, serving breakfasts and collecting school supplies)
- Collaborating with other groups such as:
 - FOCUS Churches of Albany
 - Interfaith Impact of NYS
 - Upper Hudson Planned Parenthood
 - Prison Action Network
 - Capital District Alliance for Universal Health Care
 - Peace Groups
 - Labor Religion Coalition
