Chalice- The flaming chalice symbolizes the light that guides us in our spiritual and humanitarian path. During World War II it became a symbol of risk, service and freedom that has been widely adopted by many UU congregations.

Welcoming Guests and Visitors- We would like to get to know you, and suggest that you take the opportunity to introduce yourself. An usher will bring you the microphone.

Joys and Sorrows- You are welcome to share your personal life's milestones with the congregation, even if this is your first visit. One way to do this is to place a stone in the bowl, symbolizing giving your joy or sorrow to the congregation to hold with you. If you choose, you can also write your joy or sorrow on a blue card found on the table in Community Hall lobby; indicate whether you would like it to be read during the service. Joys or sorrows can also be submitted in advance through a link found in each weekly Windows newsletter. Children- Childcare is available in Room 22 for children three and under during most services. From late May-early September your children and youth are welcome to stay with you in service. Starting in mid-September they can also choose to be with a group of people around their own age under the supervision of screened adult volunteers (two per group).
